CHAPTER 2: CRITICAL READING AND CRITICAL THINKING

Critical thinking and reading are done simultaneously, but require active participation. The ability to answer fact based questions about a novel or story is a form of simple comprehension, but does not indicate in depth the kind of understanding that is necessary for critical writing. Determine to read for meaning as well as for information.

Critical writing depends on critical reading. Most of the papers you write will involve reflection on written texts – the thinking and research that has already been done on your subject. In order to write your own analysis of this subject, you will need to do careful critical reading of sources and to use them critically to make your own argument.
